What are the odds that the man described above suffered a major stoke as a result of tumor removal surgery that led to the discovery of an aneurism? Yet the ever present smile and joy for life in his eyes is the gift he shares with all.

"I love it here. The staff treats me just



He is a master story teller and wisdom fills each one. He quotes his Dad, "If you find a job doing what you love, you'll never work a day in you life." With faith filled confidence he remembers the doctor telling his wife after the birth of their first child, that she wouldn't be able to have another. Teryears later, his daughter was born but her birth was traumatic because the umbilical cord was wrapped around her neck and nearly cost her life. Tommy promptly named her Natalie because it meant 'Christmas Gift'. Today he acknowledges that his best Christmas gift ever came from his daughter and is a small angel with Psalms 91:11 on it: For he shall give his angels charge over thee, to keep thee in all thy ways. He proudly shares that he has five grandchildren and one great grandchild. His last comment brought everything into focus, "I'm so glad God left me half a brain so I could have my wit and wisdom." Now I understood that his beating the odds was all about the FAVOR of God being on his life.

Ash Wednesday and Lent in the Episcopal Faith Tradition

In Western Christianity, Ash Wednesday marks the first day or the start of the season of Lent, which begins 40 days prior to Easter (Sundays not included). The 40 days represents the 40 days that Christ was in the desert after his baptism, the 40 years the Israelites wandered the desert in exile. Lent is a time of repentance, fasting and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time of self-examination and reflection.

The ashes are given to each person in the sign of the cross on their forehead. They are a twofold reminder. We are human. We are mortal. From dust we came and dust we shall return. Also, ashes were used in the bible as a symbol that someone was in deep sorrow over their own sins. It is an outward symbol of an inward repentance of sins.

Lent is a time when many Christians

prepare for Easter by observing a period of fasting, repentance, moderation and spiritual discipline. The purpose is to set aside time for reflection on Jesus Christ – his suffering and his sacrifice, his life, death, burial and resurrection.

Lent is a time for self-examination. Here are some questions upon which everyone should meditate during Lent:

Am I sharing gladly what I have with others, meeting other's needs, helping those who are suffering?

Do I have a gracious and patient attitude with others, am I patient with God?

Is it time for a change or a growth in my Bible study and increase my own faith?

Am I as thoughtful and forgiving of family as others, or do I take my frustrations out on them, do I expect too much, are my expectations realistic?

Do I speak up for the maligned and oppressed or do I remain silent in order to remain popular?


